A new design with the bust of Alfonso XIII and the legend "Cuba 1898 y 1899" in the cartouche at the top. This issue is known as the "Autonomy" issue as it appeared at the time when the Spanish government in an attempt to end the Cuba War of INdependence, issued a Royal decree granting autonomous government to Cuba. This failed and this is the last issue to curculate under Spanish Dominion.

The dies were engraved by Bartolome Maura and typographed by the Fabrica Bacional de Sellos, Madrid, on very thick, very white, wove paper, in sheets of 200 arrnaged in two paines of 100 (10x10), separated by a gutter. The issue is unwatermarked and perforated 14.






With the stamp issue of January 1, 1864, the practice of bisecting a stamp to use it for postage at half its value began to appear. These early bisects were not authorized. An official authorization to use bisects would first occur in 1888.

At the back of this section are several issues of "REVISTA DE LA Sociedad Filatelica Cubana" published between October 1902 and June 15, 1903 with translation into English by my father Colonel Lyman D. Bothwell Doctor of Economics, and renound Puerto Rican stamp collector. Because of the additional value a bisected stamp has there are many forgeries. The articles at the back are one of the first and most complete discriptions of the different hand stamps used in the cancellation of Cuban mail. One of the easy ways to prove a bisect is faked is if the cancellation is with a hand stamp that was not used in cuba at that time.

All references to the cancellations will use the figure numbers of these articles.

With the introduction of stamps in Cuba hand stamps to cancel them were introduced. These were called Cunos Matasellor" and were used almost exclusively up till 1870. In early usage they were used with black ink, towards the end of there usage colored inks were used primarily violet and red.



#### Cinderella Stamps

Some time during 1897, there appeared these labels purported to be stamps authorized by the leader of the Cuban Junta in Philadelphia, Marcos Morales. These were supposedly rejected because of the spelling error "Cuba Libra" instead of the correct "Libre" that appears in the design. Another account is that the labels were produced in Germany by persons who attempted to take advantage of the troubles in Cuba.

This issue never saw legitimate postal use, and the absence of the word "Correos" in the design is a fatal flaw.

#### TELEGRAPH STAMPS

In common with most countries whose government operated the telegraph system, Spain required that the fees for telegrams be paid by the use of stamps which were affixed to the copies of the messages transmitted and cancelled. This practice continued throughout the entire period of the Spanish Dominion of Cuba.

All telegraph sramps bear the word "Telegrafos" or an abbreviation of it in the design. All telegraph stamps are unwatermarked and perforated 14.



Giro Surcharge 1896

The reason for the surcharging Telegraph Stamps with the overprint "HABILITADO GIRO" with a new value is not exactly clear. Some experts think they were used for Telegraph Money orders.
