Demarcation Marking: ISLAS DE BARLOVENTO

(Applied in San Juan and Havana)

1811. San Juan, Puerto Rico, to Tarragona, Spain (forwarded to Mataro, Spain). It was carried on the brig *San Francisco de Asis* and charged the single weight rate of five reales de vellon.

One of only five reported ISLAS DE / BARLOVENTO markings applied in Puerto Rico.





to Madrid via Havana and Cadiz. Charged fifteen reales (vellon) for a letter of up to fifteen adarmes (rates of 1807).

Demarcation Marking: ISLAS DE BARLOVENTO (Applied in Havana)

Undated. Unknwon origin (possibly Mexico) to Havana, forwarded to Cadiz. Carried on the brig *Neptuno*. The addressee was charged the single weight rate of five reales de vellon. Manuscript forwarding agent marking on the flap.





1828. San Juan, Puerto Rico, to Madrid via Havana. Official mail without postal franchise charged the single weight rate of five reales de vellon.

(Applied in Havana)

1815. New Orleans to Veracruz via Havana. Unpaid single weight letter. This is the only known letter from New orleans with this marking.

1823. Havana to Guatemala City. It was carried on the Spanish warship Riquelme. Charged the single weight rate of three silver reales (the handstamp was applied in Guatemala).

1810. Havana to Veracruz. Unpaid single weight letter.





1818. Havana to London via Cadiz and France. It crossed the Spanish/French border at Bayonne and in England it was rated two shillings and two pence, the single weight rate for letters from Spain since 1814. This is the only cover that we have seen that followed this route and with these markings.

ISLAS DE BARLOVENTO

1809. Santiago de Cuba to Tarragona, Spain, via Havana. The addressee was charged seven reales de vellon for a letter of up to seven adarmes (rates of 1807). The combination of ISLAS DE / BARLOVENTO markings with other postmarks is rare.

Undated. Large front from Santiago de Cuba to Madrid via Havana. This is one of the highest rates recorded on a mailed item from Spanish possessions during the stampless era.

1844. San Juan, Puerto Rico, to Havana. It was carried on the brig Surgayen and charged the double weight rate of two silver reales.

1855. San Juan, Puerto Rico, to Havana. It was carried on the sailboat *Niña*. Unpaid single weight letter.

Only reported example of the 1½ reales postage due fee (1 real for an unpaid letter plus ½ real for the captain of a private vessel without contract to carry mail), which was only valid from June 1855 to December 1856.

1858. San Juan, Puerto Rico, to Santiago de Cuba via Havana. It was carried by the British steamers *Clyde*, to St. Tomas, and *Solent*, to Havana. It was prepaid one shilling, but the addressee was charged the incoming mail fee of one silver real.

Latest recorded example of all the ISLAS DE / BARLOVENTO markings.



Demarcation Marking: ISLAS DE BARLOVENTO

(Applied in La Coruña)

1838. Havana to Madrid via La Coruña. Sent on board the Coruña Packet. Charged 13 reales (vellon) for a letter of up to thirteen adarmes (rates of 1807).





1840. Havana to Madrid via La Coruña. The addressee was charged 9 reales (vellon) for a letter weighing up to nine adarmes (rates of 1807). Disinfected at the lazaretto of San Simon in Vigo, northwestern Spain, by sprinkling with vinegar.

1842. Havana to Madrid via La Coruña. Sent on board the Coruña Packet. Charged five reales (vellon) for a letter of up to five *adarmes* (rates of 1807).





1838. Havana to Cadiz. via La Coruña. The addressee was charged 7 reales (vellon) for a letter weighing up to seven adarmes (rates of 1807). Disinfected at the lazaretto of San Simon in Vigo, northwestern Spain, by sprinkling with vinegar.

1824. Jalapa, Mexico, to Calella, Cataluña, via Havana and Mahon, island of Menorca. Unpaid single weight rate of five reales plus one real for the transit through the Balearic Islands, where it was disinfected.

There is only one other example of this marking (1826).






1838. Havana to Madrid. Unpaid single weight rate of five reales (vellon). Disinfection slits. This is one of the rarest types of ISLAS DE / BARLOVENTO marking.

Demarcation Marking: ISLAS DE BARLOVENTO

(Applied in Havana)

1810. Havana to Orotava, Canary Islands. The addressee was charged five reales de vellon for a letter of up to five *adarmes* (rates of 1807). Disinfection slits and vinegar stains.





1801. Havana to Loudon, France, via Madrid. The addressee was charged 10 decimes for a distance between 800 and 1,000 kms (rates of 1806).

Transatlantic Mail From the West Indies and Central America to the Canary Islands and Spain

1799. Havana to Tenerife, Canary Islands. It was carried on the brig Concepcion and charged the single weight rate of four reales.





1815. Veracruz, Nueva España, to Barcelona. It was carried by the frigate *Oriente* and charged the single weight rate of seven reales.

Demarcation Marking: NUEVA ESPAÑA (Applied in Veracruz)



1791. Acapulco to Cremona, Italy, via Veracruz. Four months later it reached the addressee who was charged one lira and eighteen soldi.

Earliest known example of this type of ACAPULCO. marking.

c1800. Mexico City to Madrid via Veracruz. Official mail without postal franchise charged fifteen reales (vellon) for a letter weighing no more than 5/8 of an ounce.



Demarcation Markings: NUEVA ESPAÑA and BUENOS AYRES (Applied in Cadiz)

1822. Havana to San Sebastian, northern Spain, via Cadiz. The demarcation marking NUEVA ESPAÑA was mistakenly applied. Carried on the French warship Antigona and disinfected in Spain. It was charged 16 reales (vellon) for a letter of up to two ounces (rates of 1814).





1843. Havana to Santander, northern Spain, via Cadiz. The demarcation marking BUENOS AYRES was mistakenly applied. Unpaid single weight letter.

Maritime Mail Markings: YNDIAS and Demarcation Markings: ISLAS DE BARLOVENTO (Mistakenly applied in Cadiz)

1844. Mahon, Balearic Islands to Avila, Spain, via Cadiz. The letter was mixed with incoming correspondence from the Americas and the YNDIAS was mistakenly applied. Unpaid single weight letter. Only a handful of erroneous uses of this marking are known.





1844. Cadiz to Castro Urdiales, northern Spain. The letter was mixed with incoming correspondence from the Americas and the ISLAS DE BARLOVENTO was mistakenly applied. Unpaid single weight letter. Only a couple of erroneous uses of this marking have been reported.

1807. Cadiz to Buenos Aires via Lima. Very unusual routing, sent to the northern coast of South America to Peru, and then by overland mail to Buenos Aires. Unpaid single weight letter.





1812. Lima to Cadiz. Carried on board of the ship *Abascal*. Unpaid single weight letter (of up to 5 *adarmes*) charged eight reales (vellon).

1799. Montevideo, now Uruguay, to Buenos Aires. Carried across the River Plate. Unpaid single letter weight letter charged one real.





1856. Havana to Santiago de Cuba. Unpaid single weight letter carried on board a steamer running on the northern coast of Cuba. Only known example of the oval "VAPOR de la HABANA" in green.
