Adelante--There are two entries for Adelante in this bibliography. The first one under <A> is for the philatelic journal <u>Adelante</u> published in Santiago de Cuba in the 1920s. The second one <ADEL> is for a non-philatelic newspaper from the 1930s that I also believe (but have not been able to confirm) was published in Santiago de Cuba from the content of some articles cited in this bibliography (see articles from 1935 under *Compañía Cubana de Aviación*).

Comments on the rarity of these varieties are offered. All three varieties are illustrated.

The <u>third edition</u> consisted of three volumes: 1947, 1950, and 1959 with a total of 1575 pages. The 1959 book updated listings in the 1947 and 1950 volumes.

The <u>fourth edition</u> consisted of volumes I (1966), II (1969), III (1970), and IV (1971) with a total of 2291 pages. The <u>fifth (current) edition</u> includes volumes I (1974), II (1977), III (1978), IV (1981), V (1985), plus a <u>1983</u> <u>Pricing Supplement</u> updating prices in Vols. I, II, and III; for a total of 2800+ pp.

Unknown newspaper source, unknown date (only reference date is in the title), first and last page of the newspaper, in Spanish. [Could be from the Santiago de Cuba newspaper Adelante (see <ADEL>).] The article reports of an interview with the Secretary of Communications, Ingeniero Sanchez Aballí, and pilot Oscar Santamaría in which it was indicated that the air service between the towns of Antilla and Baracoa in the Eastern part of Cuba had been adjudicated to the Corporación Aeronáutica (Aeronautics Corporation) and would start i n October 1930. In reality, from the surviving FFCs of the inaugural flight, inauguration of the service was apparently delayed until 5 January 1931 (see Edifil Catalog FFC N17, Antilla-Baracoa).

Overview of the maritime traffic through the port of Santiago de Cuba during the decade 1858-1868. The work is useful to the postal historian in identifying ship names, shipping companies, and itineraries (other ports of call to and from Santiago de Cuba) while analyzing markings on covers of the period.

Historical background of the establishment of postal service to the town of Alacranes in the province of Matanzas, followed by illustrations and descriptions of the known types of the rare pre-philatelic postal markings of this small town until the advent of postage stamps on April 24, 1855.

<<u>ABRE7909</u>> Abreu Pérez, José Ignacio

"Las Marcas de Certificado en el Período Filatélico"

("Registry Postmarks During the Philatelic Period")

FCb, Yr.14, No.3, Sep-Dec 1979, pp.41-44 (4), ill., Span.

The title of the article should have been "Registry Postmarks During the Pre-Philatelic Period" since that is the focus of the article. Only a brief mention of the continued use of some of the pre-philatelic period registry markings during the philatelic period is made at the end of the article. The article indicates that covers with registry markings during the pre-philatelic period are extremely rare and illustrates and discusses a couple of such covers, including the postage and registry rates that applied. A few additional registry markings used during that period are also illustrated and discussed.

<<u>ABRE8501</u>> Abreu Pérez, José Ignacio

"Los sellos oficiales de Cuba 1858-1868" ("The Official Stamps of Cuba 1858-1868")

FCb, Yr.20, No.1, Jan-Apr 1985, pp.67-71 (5), ill., Span.

The article discusses the regulations establishing the use of Spanish Official Stamps for the franking of official government mail starting on January 1, 1858, and notes that in 1860 due to the lack of supplies of these stamps, they were reprinted in Havana for their continued use in the island. The article notes that the Spanish stamps were printed typographically, whereas those printed in cuba were printed lithographically. Though the stamps printed in Cuba were exact copies of the Spanish stamps, there were some minor differences that distinguish them as described in the article. Examples of both the Spanish and Cuban official stamps are illustrated along with an example of each on cover. The article ends by providing a listing of the government organizations that were authorized to use the official stamps for the franking of official correspondence.

Detailed article describing the various configurations of the loops watermark in the first issue of the Spanish Antilles stamps of 1855 (Scott 1-4).

"Letter of 28 June 1992 to Ernesto Cuesta"

From the personal files of Ernesto Cuesta, 1 page, Span.

Letter making reference to an article about the forgery of 1866 (presumably <GUER8901>) on the first paragraph and to <ABRE8909> on the second paragraph, indicating an error of the transposition of the illustrations of Types IV and IVa of the loops watermarks in the latter, which upon further observation also applies to the illustrations of Types III and IIIa.

<u>Catálogo Histórico Postal de Cuba (1855-1898)</u> (<u>Postal History Catalog of Cuba (1855-1898)</u>) Madrid, Spain: Federación Española de Sociedades Filatélicas (Spanish Federation of Philatelic Societies), Colección Cuadernos de Filatelia No.7 (Collection of Philatelic Notebooks, No. 7), 1996, 256 pp.+ list of erratas, profusely illustrated, in Spanish.

This is an outstanding work comprising the stamp and postal stationery issues of Cuba during the Spanish Administration. It includes regular postage stamp issues and postal forgeries, official stamps, telegraph stamps, revolutionary war stamps, and postal stationery. The catalog starts with a two page presentation on the postal rates of the period covered. It then proceeds to discuss in detail all of the regular postage issues in chronological order with the official stamp issues and revolutionary war issues inserted into the presentation in chronological sequence. Telegraph stamps and postal stationery are discussed in separate sections at the end of the catalog. Each issue is treated in detail with the regular values plus their known major varieties and forgeries listed, and illustrated and discussed when appropriate. Prevailing postage rates and usages are also discussed for each issue and illustrations of the cancellations known to be used in their period of circulation are reproduced or shown on actual stamps, pieces, or covers. The coverage, detail, and veracity of the work is outstanding with the exception of the sections on telegraph stamps and postal stationery which are complete and accurate, but lack the detailed discussion and illustration of usages that are the crowning glory of the postage stamps portion of the catalog. The catalog is primarily based on the private collection of Mr. Abreu with the following exceptions which he noted

on a private letter to me as belonging to the Cuban Postal Museum: all of the material concerning the Y 1-4 surcharges, the covers of the military expeditions to Mexico and the Dominican Republic (pp.75-79), and the items on pages 12, 64, 70, and 110. This catalog is an indispensable reference to the student of Cuban philately and postal history during the Spanish colonial period.

"Primera Emisión de Cuba-24 de abril, Primer Día de circulación"

("The First Stamp Issue of Cuba-24 April, First Day of Issue")

ACAD, Yr.I, No.1, Oct 2000, pp.35-37 (3), ill., Span.

This article is an overview of the first stamp issue of Cuba during the Spanish colonial period that the author claims comprises what the catalogs list as three different issues because of its initial printing in bluish paper with loops watermark, and its subsequent reprinting in rough white paper with crossed lines watermark and on smooth white paper without watermark. In discussing the first day of issue, the author maintains that the stamps went on sale on the 24th day of April 1855, but that the mail submitted to the post office on that day did not get cancelled until the next day when it was subsequently placed on the outbound ship "Conde de Regla" for Spain, thus explaining why the earliest covers of this issue are all postmarked on April 25. The article goes on to discuss the salient plate varieties that resulted over time from wear and tear of the plates and repairs made on them.

<<u>ABRE0112</u>> Abreu Pérez, José Ignacio

"El Correo Certificado en Cuba hasta 1898" ("Registered Mail in Cuba Until 1898")

ACAD, Yr.II, No.3, Dec 2001, pp.17-23 (7), ill., Span.

Quoting from <u>ACAD</u>: Despite knowing the exact date (1756) on which an organized postal service was initiated in Cuba, the date of introduction of registered mail is unknown. The oldest registered letter from Cuba, sent from Puerto Príncipe to Bayamo, dates back to the year 1803. The second recorded registered letter carries a black linear postmark from the year 1817, "CERTIFICACION A LA HABANA" printed on a letter-sheet sent to the city of Matanzas (Kouri collection). The author outlines the history of registered mail on the island from that time on through 1898.

<<u>ABRE0309</u>> Abreu Pérez, José Ignacio

"A New Postal Marking? -- ¿Una Nueva Marca Postal?"

<u>CPa</u>, Vol.15, No.45, Last Third 2003, pp.101-102, Eng & Span.

Report of two official covers from the Cuban National Archives with a handstamp that reads "El importe del franqueo corre a cargo del interesado según disposición de la Secretaría de Estado y Gobernación de Octubre de 1899." ("The postal charges shall be covered by the interested party per order of the Secretariat of State and Government of October 1899."). The article illustrates both covers and points to the fact that one of the covers was charged 6c. postage due while the other one has no indication of being charged any postage due. The author solicits information from other philatelists with similar covers that might shed some light about the apparent discrepancy in the application of the regulation to the two covers shown.

<<u>ABRE0412</u>> Abreu Pérez, José Ignacio

"El Fechador *Baeza* en Cuba" ("The *Baeza* Datestamp in Cuba") <u>ACAD</u>, Yr.V, No.8, Dec 2004, pp.53-61 (9), ill., Span.

This article is an extensive study of the circular datestamps introduced by Spain's Postmaster General, Juan Baeza, that replaced from 1842 onward the old lineal town marks with the circular datestamps that bear his name. In Cuba it was used in 84 Cuban towns with some having more than one type. Two types of this datestamp were used in Cuba and they are described in this article. The article lists all known towns where these datestamps were used, their period of use, the types used, and the colors of the ink in which they were applied. The article is profusely illustrated in color.

<<u>ABRE0500</u>> Abreu Pérez, José Ignacio

"El correo por Cordillera en Cuba" ("The 'Cordillera' mail in Cuba")

This was the study presented to the Hispanic Academy of Philately upon Mr. Abreu's induction into the Academy as a "numbered" member. The study deals with a method of transportation of the mails between interior towns in Cuba when regular postal service was not available circa the 1850s.

"Introduction and Usage of Postage Meter Machines in Cuba."

"Implantación y Uso de Máquinas de Franquear la Correspondencia en Cuba."

A select segment of the regulations of November 1935 describes the authorization of mail franking machines in Cuba. The regulations approved in 1936 and August 1938 provided the first 25 permits for the use of Pitney Bowes machines, The regulations mentioned the persons and companies that obtained those permits as well as some of the machine models to be used.

<<u>ABRE0709</u>> Abreu Pérez, José Ignacio

"Los Sellos y Canceladores de Propaganda de la Zona Franca de Matanzas"

("The Stamps and Slogan Cancellations of the Matanzas Free Zone")

ACAD, Yr.VIII, No.11, Sep 2007, pp.77-81 (5), ill., Span.

Quoting from <u>ACAD</u>, "The Free Zone of Matanzas was established in September 1934. To advertise it, the local post office began to use a slogan postmark on 2 May 1935 reading 'Our harbour has a free zone. Benefit from it. Matanzas is a free zone.' The Cuban postal service issued a set of 9 surface mail and 5 airmail stamps to commemorate the first anniversary of the establishment of the free zone. The stamps were printed in sheets of 100 units, divided by blank gutters providing four 25 copy panes. Both perforated and imperforate stamps were printed for a total of 3,965,000 stamps and they were placed in circulation on 11 May 1936". The article describes the issue and its historical background, and is profusely illustrated with color photos of the issue.

<<u>ABRE0800</u>> Abreu Pérez, José Ignacio

El Correo en la Ciudad de Matanzas (The Postal Service in the City of Matanzas)

Matanzas, Cuba: Published by the author in loose leaf form. Undated copy from the author received on 7 May 2008, 68 pp., ill., in Spanish.

This is a postal history of the evolution of the postal service in the city of Matanzas, capital of the province by the same name, built around the Bay of Matanzas, on the northern coast of Cuba to the east of the city of Habana. All information that the author has been able to collect about the postal service in the city of Matanzas from 1760 to 1958 is presented in six chapters as follows:

- I. Introduction
- II. Inception and development of the postal service in Matanzas
- III. Maritime mail

- IV. Coastal ship mail
- V. Railroad postal service
- VI. The postal corps

Each section is profusely illustrated with covers, postal markings, and other materials pertaining to the postal service of the city of Matanzas. This is another excellent piece of research from one of Cuba's most prominent philatelists.

"Grandes Portes en el período Prefilatélico de Cuba"

("Large Frankings in the Cuban Pre-philatelic Period")

CFa, Sep 2008, 1st article in the issue, 3 unnumbered pages, Span.

Frankings regurlarly used during the colonial pre-philatelic period have been separated from those the author denominated "large frankings". A limit of 6 reales is set for the large frankings. Four different categories are defined for the large frankings correspondence.

"La Agencia de Vapores y Ferrocarriles de Matanzas"

("The Steamship and Railroad Agency of Matanzas")

ATF, Yr.6, No.1, Mar 2010, pp.8-9, ill., Span.

Two covers have been found with markings of The Steamship and Railroad Agency of Matanzas. Their postmark dates differ by 26 years, and it is speculated the existence of a mail transportation company different than the Company of Maritime Post.

("The Overprint GOBIERNO REVOLUCIONARIO, 4 SEPTIEMBRE DE 1933")

FF, No.1, 2011, p.50, ill., Span. Also see <<u>GARCF0405b</u>> on the same subject.

The Cuban Postal Museum has a stamp of 10 cents of the Capitolio de la Habana (Havana Capitol) issue of 1929 (Scott 297), overprinted with a legend of three lines: GOBIERNO REVOLUCIONARIO. 4-SEPBRE. 1933. It is the only one known and was part of a lot of 32781 selected for overprinting by the government and eventually were not placed in circulation.

"Los sellos de Tasa en Cuba" ("The Postage Due Stamps in Cuba")

The article provides an overview of the regulations covering the use of postage due stamps in Cuba and illustrates both the various stamp issues and their use on cover, explaining the rationale for the imposition of the postage due fees in each case.

Compendium of Cuban postal rates from colonial times up to 1958 taken from various sources that are not identified. Most of the Republic rates are copies of relevant pages from various issues of the *Boletín de Comunicaciones (Communications Bulletin*; see <BC>) published on a regular basis by the Cuban Ministry of Communications.

"Cuba Produced Christmas Postage Stamps in 1951"

<u>AP</u>, Vol.130, No.1, WNo.1380, Jan 2016, pp.12, 103 (2), ill.

Letter to the editor correcting a statement in a previous <u>AP</u> article by Richard D. Martorelli (see <MART01512>) that incorrectly identified the 1951 Christmas stamps (Scott 469-470) as postal tax stamps. Mr. Abreu surmises

that these stamps may have been incorrectly assumed to be postal tax stamps because 25% of the proceeds of the sale of these stamps was contributed to the Communications Employees Retirement Fund. Mr. Abreu also mentions in passing that the outer frames of these stamps were printed by the Security Bank Note Co. of Philadelphia with the centers later being printed in Cuba. We note an additonal error in this "Letter to the Editor" in the fact that the illustrated Christmas stamps are not the 1951 issue, but rather the 1952 issue (Scott 498-499).

"Five Interesting Facts about the February 24, 1914 Stamp Issues of Cuba." "Cinco Datos Interesantes Sobre los Sellos Emitidos en Cuba el 24 de Febrero, 1914." <u>CPa</u>, Vol. 26, No.74, May-Aug 2016, pp.12-19 (8), ill., Eng. & Span.

The article discusses the principal characteristics of the 1914 issue known as "Los Mapitas" (the Little Maps, Scott 253-262 and Scott E5) that were the first postage stamps printed in Cuba, their sunken die proofs and plate proofs and their secret marks, the mailman booklet issues of one and two cents, the imperforated varieties, the demonetization of the issue, and some rare examples of usages on covers.

CPSA Treasurer's Report from July 1, 2017, to June 30, 2018, showing a final bank balance of \$33,406. We note the following problems with this Treasurer's Report: 1) The Spanish translation of the title should have been "Informe del Tesorero" 2) Auction fees are listed under the Income column as \$7,456, but no auction expenses are listed in the Expenses column; 3) Membership Dues are listed as \$5,585, but the total number of members listed for the period ending on June 30, 2018, is given as 218. Given that membership fees are \$30 in the U.S. and \$50 abroad, even if we assume all memberships dues to be \$30, the total for membership dues should be at least \$6,540. Even if we rest life memberships which no longer pay yearly dues, the difference between the two sums of \$955 is unaccountable; 4) What is the explanation for a "Memberships" expense of \$35?; 5) What accounts for a PayPal fee of \$189? As usual CPSA Treasurer's Reports are not clear and explanations are not forthcoming upon inquiry.

"The Man Who Printed the First Postage Stamps in Cuba – A Rags to Riches to Rags Story"

The title of of the article in Spanish does not coincide with the English title: "A Rags to Riches to Rags Story" should have been translated as "Una Historia de la Pobreza a la Fortuna Terminando en la Pobreza". The article tells the story of José Luis Rodríguez, a man of humble beginnings who married into wealth and set up the first security printing company on the Island of Cuba that printed the first postage stamps that were printed in Cuba, the 1914 "Mapita" stamps (Scott 253-262) and the associated first Special Delivery stamp (Scott E5), Edifil 195-203. By 1920 Mr. Rodríguez was a multi-millionaire with holdings besides his very successful printing company that included a controlling interest in the National Bank of Cuba and ownership of two sugar mills. Then the financial Depression of 1920-21 hit and he became financially ruined and committed suicide.

"2022 General Assembly [of the CPSA] Vote Results"

Another error in the article is the indication that the surcharge can be found on the three types of paper on which the first issue of Cuba was printed, when in fact it does not exist on the 1856 issue with crossed lines watermark referred to in the article as a "diamond" watermark. The article ends with a description of some of the varieties of the surcharge known at the time and of some of the forgeries that soon appeared on the market. Prices in British pounds are given for the standard varieties of the surcharge. The article is followed by a critique by G.A. Padro correcting Mr. Ackein's interpretation of the letter Y in the surcharge and providing additional information on surcharge measurements and varieties, but also incorrectly reporting the existence of the surcharge on paper with a "lozenges" watermark corresponding to the crossed lines watermark paper of the 1856 issue on which the surcharge does not exist.

The journal was published irregularly (roughly on a quarterly basis) from May 1936 to September-October 1964. The first issue was published as a four page "Philatelic Section" in a monthly propaganda magazine called *Souvenir* published by Andrés Belmonte, owner of the publishing house "Alfa". The "Philatelic Section" was edited by Enrique R. Stamp, pen name of the Mexican philatelist Enrique Reig. Four issues were published as part of the Souvenir magazine corresponding to the months of May, June, July, and August of 1936 and then publication temporarily ceased. It was resumed with Issue No.5 in March 1937 as a separate journal under the name *Actividades Filatélicas* that we all know. The last issue of the journal was labelled Issue No.125-126 and is dated September-October 1964.

The journal is written entirely in Spanish and contains information on a wide variety of subjects from club activities and news to articles on worldwide philatelic topics. The depth of the material ranges from the trivial to the very learned. Emphasis is on matters pertaining to Cuban philately on which there is a wealth of information on a broad range of subjects. The journal is an indispensable source for any serious student of Cuban philately. A fairly complete set of this journal exists in the U.S. National Philatelic Library at the U.S. Postal Museum, part of the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C. (donation of the late philatelist and bibliophile George T. Turner). <<u>HORN9606</u>> also cites The Collectors Club of New York as a source.

(From English summary at the end of the Spanish article in Academvs.) Although the article does not deal directly with Cuban stamped revenue paper, it is of interest to the Cuban collector of this type of material, since all Cuban stamped revenue paper was printed in Spain and the issues for Cuba closely paralled those of Spain.

All of this makes the round stamp a unitary model of exceptional importance. The author provides charts recording the motifs used each year, as well as examples of usage." These stamps also appear on Cuban revenue paper and thus this article provides extremely useful background information for the Cuban revenues philatelist.

This excellent volume which is in great part dedicated to the philatelic literature of Latin America, but contains a small section with a very good overview of Cuban philatelic literature. It lists the major works on Cuban philately in existence, most of them from this century, and provides an overview of their subject matter. Included in this summary are the principal Cuban philatelic journals and books published and the principal researchers and their areas of contribution. Mention is also made of the principal Cuban philatelic societies that sponsored the publication of the philatelic journals cited. Overall the Cuban section of this book provides a very good overview of the Cuban philatelic scene of this century, but lacks the insight that someone more familiar with Cuban philatelic literature could provide to such a summary. For example, the piece fails to mention the large number of short-lived

philatelic journals that came to light in Cuba in the first half of this century—an indication of great philatelic activity in the island. Another shortcoming is the failure to mention most contributors to Cuban philatelic literature after Castro other than Guerra Aguiar whose contributions to Cuban philately are blown out of proportion. Some corrections and updates to the information provided in the pages dealing with Cuba are summarized following: On p. 14, it should be clarified that the only local mail stamp issue for the city of Havana that has been plated is the 1860 issue (Scott 15) and that neither Barreras, Guerra Aguiar, or Cruz Planas published any studies on this matter, although Cruz Planas did considerable work on its plating. The significant published works on the plating of this issue are Diena's (see <DIEN2211>) and Prats' (see <PRAT8307>). In the way of an update, Prats has now identified the surcharges for all 170 positions on the plate. On p. 109 it must be noted that The Cuban Philatelist started publication in 1971 and not in 1979 as stated. On page 215, the quantity of 6000 copies cited for printings of the journal Revista del Círculo Filatélico de Cuba is most certainly wrong; a run of 600 copies is more likely, although still extremely high for the intended audience at the time. The "Sección Filatélica" referenced in page 218 as the initial name of the journal of the "Club Filatélico de la República de Cuba" was actually the name of a philatelic section published by the club in the monthly propaganda magazine Souvenir produced by a member of the club who owned a publishing house. The four philatelic sections printed in the Souvenir magazine are however considered to be the first four issues of the subsequent club journal Actividades Filatélicas whose first issue is labelled as issue number 5. Finally, as mentioned above, pages 218-219 overemphasize the contributions of Guerra Aguiar to Cuban philatelic literature. It is true that Guerra Aguiar was a prolific publisher, but a considerable quantity of the material that he published under his name or under the name of the Cuban Postal Museum consisted of research done by others whom he did not duly acknowledge; significant among them Barreras and Cruz Planas. The fantastic collection and archives of Cruz Planas were taken over by the Castro regime upon his death and were used as the foundation for the creation of the Cuban Postal Museum and his research was probably the foundation of a good deal of what Guerra Aguiar published. Listings for Guerra Aguiar in this bibliography try to identify plagiarized material whenever possible.

Known errors and varities are also described. In general the article contains varied and interesting information, but the reader must understand that availabe information at the time was limited and considerable additional information about this issue has appeared and its study is continually evolving.

The report also details the method of distribution of these counterfeits in the U.S. market. Mr. Andreini states that he has interviewed the printers of the original stamps and provides assurance that none of them are involved in the counterfeiting and have not sold the types used in the production of the original surcharges even when offered considerable sums of money for them. Details of the process used to print the surcharges are also provided to drive the point that their counterfeiting would be quite hard to accomplish. The article also identifies by location and name of the owner the main collections of genuine Puerto Príncipe surcharges that are known to exist and identifies whether the author has verified in person their existence. The places mentioned are Puerto Príncipe itself, Santiago, Habana, and the U.S. The article end by pointing some rarities of this issue in a couple of U.S. collections.

Each stamp bears the guarantee of their owner", but no indication is given of whether they are actually signed on the back by Mr. Andreini.

The article covers the various facets of tobacco taxation spanning all phases of its elaboration, manipulation, consumption, exportation and importation, etc. and the labels and stamps guaranteeing the product and covering all facets of its taxation. Cuba is covered on page 103 where labels guaranteeing the product and others showing payment of required taxes are illustrated and described very briefly.

Finally the article discusses the issues commemorating the 50th anniversary of the death of José Martí (Scott 418-419) and the centennary of the birth of General Antonio Maceo (Scott 423-430), complaining in both cases that both stamp issues were placed on sale after the dates of the anniversaries that they were commemorating.

On the occasion of the 100th anniversary of his ill-fated flight, Cuba issued a set of two stamps in his honor, one of which shows his picture (Scott 971-972).

The Aero Philatelic Society of America was created in 1923. It offered a publication to its members, called the "Aero-Newsletter." There were 35 issues published through June 1926. In 1926 the Aero Philatelic Society changed its name to the American Air Mail Society. In July 1926 it published the first issue of the "Aero-News." The last issue of the "Aero-News was the August-September 1927. At that time, the offical organ of AAMS became "Philatelic Gossip" published by AV Dworak of the Gossip Printery. This continued through October 1928. The original "Airpost Journal" was first published on November 1929 as an independent venture of Holcomb York, owner of the Berkshire Exchange. It was used as a supplement to Berkshire's "Standard Airpost Catalogue" (aka The Berkshire Catalog). On September 24, 1931 the Airpost Journal was acquired by the American Air Mail Society, headed by president, Herbert H Griffin. With George D. Kingdom as editor-in-chief, it's October 1931 issue (Vol II, No 6, Issue 18) became the AAMS's first issue and AAMS's official monthly aero-philatelic publication. It was distributed to each AAMS member with the cost of publication included in member's annual dues. The Airpost Journal contains articles promoting various fields of aero-philatelic interest, such as the collecting of air mail stamps and flown aero-philatelic covers and related historical data associated with the inauguration and expansion of air mail services.

Biographical notes about Pilot Basil L. Rowe, pioneer pilot of the 1920s who organized the "Rowe Flyers" who barnstormed through the West Indies and the U.S. on pioneer flights and was later pilot for the West Indian Aerial Express and Pan-American Airways, carrying first mails on many of his flights, including several through Cuba. Many of the covers he carried bear his autograph.

The article illustrates a cover with an oval Habana - Franco handstamp originating in Cuba that was incorrectly charged 4 maravedíes when it should have been charged 8 maravedíes since it originated in Cuba and was subject to the same charge as correspondence from another province of the Spanish kingdom. The surcharge on the cover from Cuba was blue.

Postal administrations were subsequently authorized to manufacture their own postmarking devices, giving rise to different models of this mark." The article reports the finding of a second copy of the largest of these postmarks from Cartagena de Indias, Colombia. The article is cited in this bibliography because this postal marking was also used in Havana and the information provided in the article helps to understand its use in Cuba.

Three notes about Cuban stamps. The first one corrects a report in the 6 June 1927 issue of MK that the 10 special delivery stamp showing a view of the Morro Castle and an airplane (Scott E6) was an air mail stamp. The second note indicates that the imperforate stamps Scott 280-282 were intended for sale in vending machines, but were found inadequate for that purpose and were instead sold at post office counters. The third note lauds Cuba for only having issued one commemorative stamp to date and keeping the designs of its regular stamps pretty constant, a practice that Mr. Ash believes has not been matched by any other country.

<<u>ASH2801</u>> Ash, E. M.

"Mr. E.M. Ash nominates the cancellation longest in use in any country..."

MK, Vol.42, No.1, WNo.1930, 2 January 1928, p.8.

The nominated cancellation is the Cuban "parrilla" mute cancellation which Mr. Ash indicates was in use from the first issue of Cuban stamps until 1914. He provides evidence of the latter with a block of four 10c stamps from his collection that were issued in 1914 and were cancelled with a parrilla cancellation at that late date.

"Guantánamo Bay. A Cuban Post Office in U.S. Territory." <u>AP</u>, Vol.53, No.1, WNo.465, October 1939, pp.25-26.

In 1939, due to an increase in correspondence, a Cuban post office was opened at the Guantánamo Naval Base. The increase was due to the large number of ships congregated in the bay. In addition, to avoid delayed correspondence, the cancellation of letters on these ships was permitted.

<<u>ASMC</u>> <u>Alfred Smith & Co.'s Monthly Circular - Alfred Smith & Son's Monthly Circular</u>

The <u>Alfred Smith & Co.'s Monthly Circular</u> started publication in 1875, and starting with the issue of January 1894, it was renamed the <u>Alfred Smith & Son's Monthly Circular</u>. Listed under this entry are an index comprising the years 1875 to 1910, and some of the more interesting and substantial items reported. Many of the

items in the monthly circular were simply news or reports of new issues that do not warrant their inclusion in this bibliography. The index was compiled by Bertram T.K. Smith (the son in the circular's title) and was published in London by The Philatelic Literature Society of Bath, England.

Report of the plan to issue a new set of stamps in 1875 with heading "ULTRAMAR" for use in both Cuba and Puerto Rico, listing only three denominations: 12, 25, and 50 céntimos de peseta (missing the 1 pta. value, Scott 66). The report illustrates the Spanish stamp whose design will be used for the Ultramar issue. The stamp issue is listed in the Cuba section of the Scott Catalog as Nos. 63 to 66.

"The Philatelic Newsletter"

<u>ASMC</u>, No.6, 1 June 1875, p.1. Also listed under the author of the newsletter, Overy Taylor (TAYL7506>). Item on the "Correo Insurrecto" stamp Edifil No.1, issued by the Government of the Cuban Republic at Arms in 1874 to raise funds for the Cuban independence movement. The article indicates that these stamps were being reported in the philatelic press of the time as bogus items. In fact these stamps were indeed used privately to frank mail between revolutionary parties, but because of their compromising nature, correspondence bearing them was mostly destroyed after receipt. The Edifil catalog indicates that 100,000 of these stamps were printed by the American Bank Note Company. "Cuba " <u>ASMC</u>, No.13, 1 Jan 1876, **p.3**, ill.; "Philippine Islands" <u>ASMC</u>, No.15, 1 Mar 1876, p.2, ill.; "New Issues: Cuba" <u>ASMC</u>, No.16, 1 Apr 1876, p.2, ill.

Report of a new issue of stamps for Cuba featuring the effigy of Alfonso XII, identical to the Philippines issue of the previous year, but with the header reading "Ultramar 1876" instead of "Filipinas" as shown in the Philippines stamp illustrating the January article. The article describes proofs of the stamps in dark green paper provided by a correspondent in Cuba with denominations of 25 and 50 c. and 1 peso. The colors of the stamps to be issued are hard to distinguish from the proofs, but are guessed to probably be brown, light blue, and black, respectively. The March issue report is incorrectly titled "Philippine Islands", but is really a follow-up on the January report verifying that the colors of the 50 c. and 1 peso stamps had been correctly reported in the January issue, but that the 25 c. stamp was mauve in color instead of brown, and that there is also a 12 1-2 c. stamp in light green in the set. All stamps are to be printed on white paper and perforated. The April issue reports that the title of the March article should have been "Cuba" instead of "Philippine Islands" and that the 1 peso value should have been given as 1 peseta, not 1 peso.

<u>ASMC</u>, No.26, Feb 1877, p.19. Also listed under the author of the newsletter, Overy Taylor (<TAYL7702>). Brief note reporting the discovery by a Mr. de Ysasi of the use of Cuba's 1857 stamps in Santo Domingo in 1862. The note requests further clarification on the exact use of these stamps, whether used internally or externally and if the latter whether used generlly or applicable to particular destinations. See <ASMC87704> for a follow-up article. On the same page there is another entry labeled "Cuba" reporting on the denominations and color of the new issue of 1877 Alfonso XII stamps for Cuba.

ASMC, No.26, Apr 1877, p.49. This is a follow-up from <ASMC87702> = <TAYL7702>.

Further notes on the use of Cuba's 1857 stamps in Santo Domingo after receiving additional information from Mr. de Isasi with a couple of examples from his collection: one loose stamp cancelled in Santo Domingo in 1862 and a second one on a cover from 25 July 1865 sent from Santo Domingo to Alacranes in Cuba. What Mr. de Isasi and the editor of ASCM, Overy Taylor, don't realize is that there is a town in Cuba called Santo Domingo and that more likely, these stamps were canceled there and not in the Dominican Republic.

ASMC, No.324, Dec 1901, p.123.

Report that the plates for the special delivery issue with the error "immediata" (Scott E2) had been corrected, but that the stamps with the correct spelling "inmediata" (Scott E3) had not yet been printed.

<<u>ASMC90209</u>> <u>Alfred Smith & Co.'s Monthly Circular</u>

"New Issues: Cuba"

ASMC, No.333, Sep 1902, p.67.

News that the special delivery stamp with the "immediata" error corrected to "inmediata" was sent out from New York on July 3rd, but would not be issued for some time. However, we know after the fact that the stamp was placed in circulation on 21 November 1902, thus making it a Republic of Cuba issue.

Report of the commemoration of the centennary of the issue of Cuba's first postal stamp on April 24, 1955, and the announcement of an International Philatelic Exhibition to be held in Havana in November 1955. The report includes an assortment of photos of mainly Cuban personalities with detailed descriptions of their philatelic interests or roles in promoting Cuban philately.

"Una Variedad No Catalogada" ("An Uncataloged Variety") CP, Vol.VII, No.3-4, July 1978, p.82, ill.

Report of an uncataloged variety of the special delivery stamp of 1953, Scott No.E18. The second printing is "not" as sharp as the first printing (the word "no" is missing in the phrase "una impression NO tan nítida" in the Spanish version of the piece.

"Dr. Tomás A. Terry" <u>BM</u>, No.19, Sep-Dec 1984, p.83, ill., Span. & Eng. Recollection of the last visit of Dr. Terry to Miami and the dinner organized in his honor by the Cuban Philatelic Society; prompted by receipt of the news of his death in Cuba shortly after his return.

"La Sobrecarga Invertida del 3c. sobre el 2c. de la emisión del Tabaco" ("The Inverted 3c. over 2c. Surcharge in the Tobacco Issue") <u>BNJ</u>, No.12, Oct 1984, pp.8-9, ill., Spanish with English summary on p.21.

Recollection of the discovery of Scott 512 with the surcharge inverted a couple of months after the stamps were put on sale 16 June 1953 and the subsequent efforts to establish the number of inverted surcharges printed and track down other examples. The article establishes that only one sheet of 70 stamps with inverted surcharges was sold to the public and three other sheets of 70 were found by the printer and destroyed. Out of the 70 that were sold to the public, 7 or 8 examples are known to have survived--all are used.

Story of the discovery of a double surcharge on a sheet of 100 of the perforated international sky train stamp (Scott C16) by Rafael R. García, the well-known Cuban dealer, his accusation by the postal authorities of forging the double surcharge, and his subsequent exoneration from any wrongdoing. The stamps were printed using a plate of 200 subjects in two sheets of 100, but it was not until some time later that a portion of the second sheet (86 stamps) was found by another philatelist who had bought them and put them aside, not noticing the error. This finding helped dispel doubts about the authenticity of the error.

Report of an unofficial overprint of stamps that occurred during the coup d'état on March 10, 1952. It is noted that five letters with overprinted stamps circulated, three addressed to Cuban philatelic houses, one to an American philatelist, and the fifth to the author. There is suspicion that the overprint was done by a military person as a philatelic souvenir. It was typed and reads in two lines: "GOBIERNO REVOLUCIONARIO" - "10 de marzo 1952." See the following initial articles on the subject: <GUER5803b> and <TERR5803>.

Report of the discovery of errors in the dates of birth of the three Cuban patriots shown in the 2c, 5c, and 50c values of the definitive issue of 1954 honoring Cuban patriots (Scott 519-528). The discovery of the errors was first reported in a major Cuban daily newspaper and caused such commotion that it prompted the Ministry of Communications to create a special commission to look into the matter with the result that they found additional date errors in the 10c and \$1 values. Also see report of error in <ROSE8510a>.

<AteF> <u>Atenas Filatélico</u>, Segunda Etapa (Second Phase)

Matanzas, Cuba: Journal of the philatelic circle of the city of Matanzas *Círculo Filatélico Dr. Laudelino González*, illustrated, in Spanish. Format is 8.5 by 11 inch sheets printed landscape two pages to each side, folded in the middle and stapled to form a 5.5 by 8.5 inch booklet; all pages are unnumbered. In email communications sustained with Mr. Busto (<<u>BUST1705</u>>, he indicates that the "First Phase" bulletins of <u>Atenas Filatélico</u> were published many years before the "Second Phase" bulletins and were probably mimeographed in purple ink that faded over the years. A few remaining copies at the Matanzas philatelic club were so faded that they were barely legible and all were discarded. No copies of the "First Phase" bulletins are known to have survived. Mr. Busto also indicates that although José Ignacio Abreu Pérez was the Director of the "Second Phase" publication of the journal, he himself was the "de facto" Editor.

The author also surmises about the possible meaning of the numerals 1 through 6, and 12 in the center of the cancellations, but does not come to a firm conclusion.

The catalog is based on a series of articles published in various publications between 1871 and 1881 and published as a book in 1952. The articles describe the forgeries made by the Spiro brothers in Hamburg, Germany, Since the Spud Papers were published in the late 19th century, collectors have found many more Spiro forgeries. Today, more than 400 different forgeries have been recorded. The Spanish 1855 official stamp described on p.47 was also used in Cuba, and the description of the forgeries of the 1866 and 1867 Cuban issues on p.58 refers the reader to the preceding description of forgeries of the 1864 stamps of the Philippines that start on p.57 as models for the Cuban forgeries. Also discussed are forgeries of the Cuban issues of 1870 on pp.44-45, 1867 again on pp.102-103, 1871 on pp.103-104, and 1873 on pp.119-120. Page 161 contains references to the original publication of Cuban forgeries in the original 1870s Spud Papers.

Detailed article on the new set of three 1c, 2c, and 5c imperforate stamps (Scott 280-282) printed from the same plates as Scott 264, 265, and 268 in sheets of 400 stamps divided into four panes of 100 stamps each by solid straight cutting lines. The author explains that the stamps were originally intended to be used in vending machines, but that they were never used for that purpose because in trials the island's humidity made the stamps stick to each other causing the vending machines to malfunction. Thus the stamps were subsequently placed on sale at post offices together with the normal perforated issues.

Letter from Mr. Avery providing background information on the initial intended use of imperforate 1c and 2c stamps Scott 280-281 for sale in slot machines that did not work properly and were withdrawn from sale. However, some were obtained by speculators and were being sold as great rarities, so the postal authorities were requested to put them back on sale and they complied, but only sold them through the central post office in Havana. No mention is made in the article about the 5c value of the imperforate set, Scott 282.

Description of the new Cuban Pan-American Congress stamp issue (Scott 284-293) with a description of the theme depicted in the center of each stamp. The author predicts that this will be a very popular set and urges the readers to acquire it. All stamps in the set are illustrated in a subsequent issue of MK (see AVER2801b>).

MK, Vol 42, No.19, WNo.1948, 7 May 1928, p.303.

Advertisement offering offering two envelopes with Cuba Scott C2 and two different Lindbergh cachets for a special price. Both covers are illustrated and the ad goes on to offer other Cuban stamps used and unused. It is interesting to note that Mr. Avery lists his mailing address in the ad as Progreso 11, Habana, Cuba.
