The Higgins & Gage catalog's numbering system is the most widely used in the stamp trade in describing Cuban postal stationery of the Spanish Administration and the Republic, such as Scott's is for postage stamps and Forbin is for revenues. Postal stationery of the U.S. Administration, is usually described following the numbering systems of <UPSS7100> and <SCOTSPEC>. The catalog prices are currently grossly outdated and are only of value as an indication of the relative value of the items listed.

The catalog does not illustrate the cover, but included in this entry are privately obtained photocopies of the front and back of the cover, and of an accompanying affidavit by the plane's crew certifying its authenticity.

The article starts with the first issue of stamps and post cards differentiating those intended for use in Cuba from those intended for use in Puerto Rico. Each year issue from 1877 to 1883 is described and discussed in detail from Cuba's point of view, including the design, engraver, denominations, colors, varieties (e.g., proofs, double impressions, plate varieties (especially in the 1883 overprinted issues), and usages (e.g., periods of use, rates, use of bisects). The article ends with the parenthetical note "To be continued." Unfortunately, World War I broke out and SGMJ ceased publication until October 1823 and the article was never continued. The article does not discuss the Puerto Rico issues. We do not know whether the Puerto Rico issues were intended to be discussed in the continuation article or articles. Overall, the presentation also seems a bit haphazard (e.g., not all post card issues are discussed and in some sections reference is made to revenue stamps used as postage which is out of the scope of the article).

Quoting <WINT9204>: "This book gives a detailed accounting of most of the early U.S. postal arrangements with European countries. It presents a scholarly treatment of the events leading to the postal arrangements, gives the details of the arrangements, and provides examples of covers carried under those arrangements with Hargest's analysis of each cover. He also shows many representative markings found on the covers. ... it is an essential

reference book in understanding the treaties with European states. Hargest makes an attempt to list all the rates to foreign countries in two large tables at the end of the book, but his information is quite incomplete and sometimes in error." (See <STAR8200> for rates.) The information in this book is vital to the Cuban postal historian for the understanding of rate markings on covers to and from Cuba to Europe via the United States.

It is an essential reference for the student of Cuban postal history in understanding the rates and regulations that governed mail with members of the GPU/UPU after May 1, 1877.

This was not a large holding of Cuban items but the sale included some outstanding rarities, including a block of 12 (4x3) of Scott #5; a block of 9 of Scott #15; an important collection of the 1883 ornamental surcharges that included three full sheets of the 5c value with different settings of the surcharges, one full sheet each of the 10c and 20 c values, and a block of 45 of the 20c value with displaced surcharges; several rare Puerto Príncipe stamps; the inverted centers of 1910; and a complete set of horizontal imperforate pairs of the 1914 map issue.

The "Manuel Gálvez" Collection of Proofs and Essays of the Americas

This sale only featured one Cuban lot of small die proofs of the 1899 2c, 3c, 5c, 10c, and 1902 10c Special Delivery stamps in their issued colors on India on card. The 10c 1902 Special Delivery stamps is misdescribed as

being 2c in the catalog listing. It is odd that the reknowned Spanish stamp dealer Manuel Gálvez should have had such a poor representation of Cuban proofs. Perhaps his major holdings of Cuban proofs were of the Spanish Administration and were sold separately. In any case, the catalog contains a considerable holding of proofs of other countries of the Americas and is thus of extreme interest to the specialist in that type of material.

The Cuban material in this sale was from the Ignacio Prats collection (this entry is also listed as <PRAT0704>). However, with some possible exceptions, the material was not from his main collections but rather from his files of reference and secondary material. Lots #160-176, 201-202, and 208 were withdrawn since they were mistakenly taken from a stockbook of forgeries. This fact was noted by Prats and he promptly notified the auctioneer who withdrew the lots.

The Cuban material comprised a large holding of early issues including and a large collection of postal history with stampless covers, town cancels, incoming covers from other countries, foreign destinations, Correo Marítimo markings, British and French postal agencies in Cuba, and US Postal Administration in Cuba. Images of most lots in the sale are available in my library, as well as PDF files of the following large lots: 203, 204, 207 (Part 1 and Part 2), and 210. A copy of the auction catalog with marginal notes of prices realized at the auction is filed under Prats.

This was an extraordinary sale of Cuban covers from the U.S. Administration period (excluding Puerto Príncipe surcharges) with a handful of covers from the early Republic. Most of the covers bore either U.S. stamps used in Cuba or Scott Nos. 221-231, E1-E2, and J1-J4. Included in the mix were several U.S. Military Station covers and a sprinkling of postal stationery items. Among the rarest were a Military Station No.25 at Cristo cover, a couple of postal stationery envelopes with double overprints, and a rare used Scott U9 with knife #57 (one of two known used—the other one is in the Octavio Cabrera postal stationery collection).
